LEARNING STRUCTURE (8 HOURS)

Block 1 – Foundations of Financial Intelligence

This session builds a strong foundation by explaining what financial intelligence means in modern organizations and why it is essential for effective decision-making. It helps participants become comfortable with financial language, concepts, and logic, regardless of prior finance experience, and removes fear or hesitation around numbers.

It covers:

- What financial intelligence is and what it is not
- Why financial understanding matters for all professionals
- Difference between accounting, finance, and business performance
- How financial information supports decisions

Block 2 – Understanding Financial Statements at a High Level

This session focuses on building practical familiarity with financial statements so participants can confidently read and interpret them without getting lost in technical detail. It emphasizes understanding purpose, meaning, and business implications rather than accounting mechanics.

It covers:

- Purpose of income statement, balance sheet, and cash flow statement
- How to read financial statements at a basic level
- Key relationships between statements
- What financial statements reveal about business health

Block 3 – Revenue, Costs & Profitability Logic

This session strengthens understanding of how organizations generate revenue, control costs, and achieve profitability. Participants learn how everyday operational and strategic decisions influence financial outcomes and long-term performance.

It covers:

- Revenue models and pricing basics
- Fixed vs variable costs
- Contribution margin and profitability
- How cost decisions impact results

Block 4 – Cash Flow, Liquidity & Financial Health

This session focuses on explaining why cash flow is critical to business survival and growth. Participants develop clarity on how cash moves through an organization and how poor cash management can create risk even when profits appear strong.

- Difference between profit and cash
- Cash inflows and outflows
- Liquidity and working capital basics
- Common cash flow challenges

Block 5 – Budgeting, Forecasting & Financial Planning

This session addresses how budgeting and forecasting support financial discipline, accountability, and informed decision-making. Participants learn how plans are created, monitored, and adjusted in real business environments.

- Purpose of budgets and forecasts
- Planning versus actual performance
- Managing variances
- Using budgets for better decisions

Block 6 – Financial Metrics & Performance Indicators

This session focuses on helping participants understand commonly used financial metrics and performance indicators. It builds the ability to interpret numbers meaningfully, ask better questions, and avoid blind reliance on metrics without context.

It covers:

- Key financial ratios and indicators
- Efficiency, profitability, and growth measures
- Using metrics responsibly
- Avoiding metric misuse

Block 7 – Financial Thinking for Everyday Decisions

This session strengthens the ability to apply financial thinking to daily work decisions across non-finance roles. Participants learn how to evaluate trade-offs, assess impact, and consider financial consequences in routine professional situations.

It covers:

Evaluating trade-offs and cost implications

Financial impact of operational decisions

Risk and return basics

Asking the right financial questions

Block 8 – Personal Financial Intelligence Action Plan

This final session focuses on long-term application and confidence-building. Participants consolidate learning, identify personal gaps, and develop a practical approach to using financial intelligence consistently in their roles rather than treating it as a one-time skill.
